Notes:
Students who receive As or Bs in ENG 121, ENG 123, and their first ENG 200-level course are eligible to begin upper-division coursework after that. They should see the English department chair to have their second ENG 200-level course waived. For students beginning upper-division coursework in the spring semester of their sophomore year, we recommend ENG 300 and perhaps one other upper-division class.
Students may fulfill one of their ENG 300-400-level English electives with an upper-division WRI or THR course.
Students may repeat ENG 320, ENG 321, and ENG 496 for credit as topics change.
The high number of electives outside the English major mean students can easily double major, pursue one or two minors, and/or go to Italy for a semester. Popular double majors for English include: psychology, theology, history, and writing. Popular minors include: history, business, journalism, creative writing, and the certificate in professional writing.

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
